EMPTY!

On the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. (Luke 24.1-2)

"It's empty!" the women who appear at the tomb on that first Easter Sunday may have said with dismay and confusion. When we find that things are empty, we usually have a negative response - whether it's our wine glass or the food cupboard, the petrol tank or our bank account, yet another discarded plastic bottle or a bombed house, a promise or a feeling of the soul, the hospital bed or that chair...

Finding things empty is often hard. Finding things empty doesn't normally fill us with joy and confidence.

And yet, there is something positive in the emptiness that those women found three days after the crucifixion of Jesus - something good that can help us to cope with all the other emptiness.

The darkness of the events of Good Friday can seem hard to imagine. A good

and innocent man was put to death. This man who had been healing bodies, hearts and lives, who had been teaching the good and loving ways of God, who had been inviting people to find rest and peace in his promises, and who had been offering people the gift of eternal life. That man was killed.

And so Jesus lay in a blackened tomb – a ton-weight stone sealing him in.

The emptiness of the hearts of his followers must have been so very hard to bear.

However, let's not forget that this was the man who had been healing bodies, hearts and lives, who had been teaching the good and loving ways of God, who had been inviting people to find rest and peace in his promises, and who had been offering people the gift of eternal life!

The brutal death and dark tomb was the only way he could follow through on the promises. But, this wasn't the end of the story. For such was that man, that the tomb could not contain the power and love that he embodied. The Son of God burst from death to life revealing an empty tomb that speaks of an open way to life in all its fullness. The emptiness is an invitation to us from the Creator of the universe – one that beckons us into relationship with that man.

When we feel empty ourselves or we are weighed down with the emptiness



we see and experience around us, there is something – someone – that can flood in and fill the space with the love that we all so need, love that is so plentiful that it couldn't be contained in the tomb.

In the emptiness of life, we find despair, lack, longing, suffering, fear, absence. In the emptiness of the tomb, we find hope, meaning, comfort, new life, light, presence. the emptiness of In the tomb. that found! we find are we





The spring term has been extremely productive and the pupils have been settled, hardworking and full of spark. Every day brings a new challenge and it's always a pleasure to see young, inquisitive minds embrace learning

with such enthusiasm. School has welcomed several new families this term and our pupils have done a wonderful job helping them settle; we wish them every success and look forward to an exciting journey together.

One of the highlights of the year is Book Week: a fun-filled, literary rollercoaster aimed at celebrating stories, books, poems, and the creative magic of authors. Our year 6 pupils spent an afternoon at Holly Bank Care Home sharing their own English work with residents. It was a huge success and a wonderful opportunity to spend some valuable time with the local community. Thank you to the staff and residents for making us feel so welcome. In addition to this, all the pupils had a lesson with Fiona Barker, writer and author, to learn about her latest book about swifts. The pupils really enjoyed the experience and it certainly inspired us all to be a bit braver with our writing. The week culminated in World Book Day and the pupils had the opportunity to dress as a book character or wear pyjamas and read to their favourite teddy.

Charity work is at the heart of many of our whole school events and is a good reflection of our school vision. The World Book Day donations were sent off to an organisation that provides books for children and adults who face challenging situations. 


