

Letter from the Parsonage, Beetham

Dear friends,

ne of the many gifts that the Christian year gives us is a rhythm and pattern for the changing of the seasons. An opportunity to acknowledge and celebrate God's involvement and interest in all parts of life, our everyday tasks and our daily business - however mundane or ordinary they might seem. There is nothing so the scriptures tell us - that is off limits to the care and concern of the Almighty, and whilst this can often be a difficult thing for us to fathom, it offers the promise of hope and assurance as we face the joys and sorrows that life offers. As we read in the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes, 'For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven'.

This awareness of God's provision is perhaps best captured, at least in the popular imagination, by the autumnal celebrations of Harvest. The time in the year where we, with prayerful intention and thanksgiving, are encouraged and given opportunity to give thanks for all the good things that surround us. For many of us this pattern of gratitude, as the days get shorter and the colder weather begins arrives, will have been established from an early age.

The concept of 'Harvest Festival' still something that holds a prominent place in our

imagination, regardless of whether we live in town our country, village or city.

Indeed, aside from Christmas and Easter, perhaps my most formative experiences of 'going to church' as a child were the traditions associated with both 'bringing in' and 'giving thanks' for the Harvest. Not least the annual tradition of putting together a box of fresh fruit and vegetables at home that would duly be presented at the altar on Harvest Sunday. The tangible, and very real, reminder that – whilst it is easy to forget – it is from God that all good things come.

Although, with the passing of years, the nature of our celebrations might have changed, and methods of harvest and food sourcing and production have dramatically altered. It is still good, in a world of technological advancement and rampant consumerism, to have opportunity to remember and pray for all those on whom we depend for our daily bread. All those involved in a myriad of different ways, from farm to fork, of ensuring that our needs are supplied, whilst praying too that the earth's bounty, riches and resources might be more equitably shared and distributed.

This, of course, is something that we are aware of both on a global, national and local scale. The effects of climate change in shaping the suitability of crops and its impact on the mass movement of peoples numbers trapped by poverty across the

world, the despairing rise in the charitable endeavours locally that seek to support those in need of practical help and nourishment. Harvest-time brings the recognition, if any further prompt was needed, that much more work is needed if we are to live in a world where every human life, made in the image of God, is accorded equal value and worth. As Mahatma Gandhi once, memorably, remarked: 'The world has enough for everyone's need, but not enough for everyone's greed'.

This vision, of course, is part and parcel of what Jesus in the gospels called 'the Kingdom of God' – not a defined place or location, but a reality in which we are all invited to live, in which no-one can be forgotten and where all can find a welcome. It is this Kingdom that we pray for as we look to give thanks this harvest-time, a Kingdom of justice and righteousness, of peace and equity, of compassionate service and restored relationships, of liberty and love.






